The walk was an amazing experience — a true test of our physical and mental limits. From the start, team morale was sky-high. On Friday, we all made our way to the campsite and then headed to the pub for dinner before settling in for what turned out to be one of the worst nights' sleeps many of us had ever had.

Saturday morning came, and we got up, had some breakfast, and set off on our journey around the island. For the first two legs, we stayed together as a team, and spirits were high. After leaving the first major checkpoint, we began to break off into smaller groups, each finding our own pace.

At the 32km mark, the blisters started appearing, and the thought of a cold beer crept into our minds. Around 42km, we found our first pub of the journey — it took the barman longer to pour four pints and take our money than it did for us to drink them! Approaching the halfway mark at 52km, a few of the team had reached their limit and made the difficult decision to call it there. A huge achievement in itself. For those of us continuing, the halfway point was a chance to eat, strap up our feet, change into warmer clothes, and brace ourselves for the night ahead.

Walking through the night was the hardest part — the scenic coastal views had gone, replaced by quiet towns and industrial estates. We were now in smaller groups, each walking at their own pace.

The 72km checkpoint, around 3–4 AM, was a serious mental battle. We were exhausted, and that was the point many of us could have easily given up. But we pushed on. The next leg was brutally physical, and at the 82km checkpoint, most decided to call it. That left just six of us: Tom, Tim, Fraser, Elliot, Harry, and Daniel.

With 24km to go, we downed coffee, wrapped our feet again, and set off. The route took us down towards the sea, and while morale lifted slightly, fatigue was real — we were now battling to stay awake while walking.

We hit the final checkpoint at 92km, knowing we had just 14km left. Spirits were up — briefly. That final stretch included an unforgiving uphill section, and I think every one of us had a moment where we hit our limit. But when we saw the 104km marker and glimpsed the finish line, something shifted. Spirits soared, and the pace picked up.

Crossing the finish line was an unbelievable feeling — a huge sense of pride. We had pushed ourselves beyond what we thought possible and come through the other side. It was a brutal, unforgettable experience and a real testament to our resilience, grit, and team spirit.

I am ridiculously proud of my team.

I already knew we had an amazing group at AWE – The Hub but seeing those who took part in this challenge has left me in absolute awe of their mental and physical strength.

It's not just the team members who took part that deserve recognition—the support, generosity, and encouragement from everyone else has been just as inspiring.

We all work under an immense amount of pressure to deliver what we're building here, but the way we pull together as a team especially when it matters most—shows just how special this group is.

Raising £12,400 for a local facility that does so much good is an incredible achievement. I honestly can't thank everyone enough.






Míll Cottage Farm Experíence

On May 6th, the Family Support Team proudly hosted the official opening of their new garden. The event was opened by The Town Mayor, Councillor Annette Eyre.

The garden will provide a year-round venue for the family support groups. Funding for the playground was primarily provided through the Alton Town Council Community Infrastructure Levy and the Local Children's Partnership, with equipment purchased through support from local councillors.
