

Summer Reading Challenge 2025 - Story Garden

Funded childcare hours for children of working parents - apply in plenty of time

If you are an eligible working parent, you can apply for:

✓ Up to 30 hours childcare per week over 38 weeks of the year, if you have a child between 9 months old and 4 years old. Your child must be at least 9 months old on or before 31 August.

Apply now to get your funded childcare code to start in September 2025. If you plan to return to work from parental leave or start a new job by the end of September, you can also apply for a childcare code.

Don't be Miserable with Measles

Cases of measles are increasing in England, as well as abroad. Measles is a highly infectious viral illness, so anyone with symptoms is advised to stay at home and phone their GP or NHS 111 for advice, rather than visiting the surgery or A&E, to prevent the illness spreading further. Having two doses of the Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR) vaccine is the best way to protect your child and help prevent measles spreading, especially to those most vulnerable.

Make sure your children are up to date with their 2 MMR doses. Check your child's personal child health record (PCHR), known as the red book, or contact your GP practice. You may also be able to check their vaccination status on the NHS App. There is information about measles on the NHS website.
